Task-based language teaching is a student-centered approach to second language instruction.Â In task-based teaching, the center of the learning process moves to the students themselves and allows them to come to the realization that language is a tool to tackle and (re)solve real-world problems. The process of task-based learning itself teaches important skills. Students learn how to ask questions, how to negotiate meaning and how to interact in and work within groups. Task-based teaching (TBT) is believed to be one of the approaches that emphasize real life and creative language use. It offers students an opportunity to do something in the classroom that they in everyday life. This approach is aimed at using a foreign language naturally without any force or feeling of "have to". The main focus of the classroom activity is the task and a foreign language is just a tool used by students to do it. Task-based language teaching is not new. Prabhu<sup>1</sup> used a task-based approach with secondary school classes in Bangalore, India, on his Communicational Teaching Project, beginning in 1979. American Government Language Institutions switched to task-based instruction (TBI) for foreign languages for adults in the early 1980s.<sup>2</sup> Some of the teachers writing for this book have been using task-based learning (TBL) for many years and all are convinced of its value. Other teachers and institutions are following suit.

Task-based language learning is an approach where the planning of learning materials and teaching sessions are based around doing a task. In education, a task refers to an activity where communication is necessary: for example; deciding something, solving a problem, designing or organising something, or telling someone to do something. Task-based learning is the approach that Net Languages applies to most of its material design. A different approach would be to design a course around a grammar syllabus TBL (Task-based learning), or TBLT (Task-based language teaching) is an approach in which learning revolves around the completion of meaningful tasks. In the TBL approach, the main focus is the authentic use of language for genuine communication. In order for us to understand TBL, we need to define what a task is. Task-based language learning uses practical tasks to help students find their own useful vocabulary and language structures. Example tasks might be going food shopping, visiting the doctor, dealing with issues in an airport, making a telephone call, being interviewed or conducting an interview, ordering a taxi, complaining about a meal in a restaurant or resolving an issue in a shop.
