RESEARCH IN PROGRESS

My recent book, *The Scholar Denied: W. E. B. Du Bois and the Birth of Modern Sociology*, continues to exert significant influence in sociology and the social sciences, nationally and internationally. It has challenged sociologists to rethink the canon and how we teach sociology, especially sociological theory and methodology. Yet, for substantive changes to occur, more scholarship is required to add new insights to those discovered and shared in *The Scholar Denied*. Research is needed to document the work of many scholars who have been denied and to reclaim their work to reinvigorate the discipline. More scholarship is required to understand how knowledge production processes work and how schools of thought are generated and sustained.

Many of my recent scholarly activities have centered on additional research and writing on issues highlighted by *The Scholar Denied* that have not received adequate attention. I recently organized an editorial team to produce a definitive handbook on W. E. B. Du Bois's scholarship that is under contract with Oxford University Press. This project will take several years to complete. Thus, most of my future work will address the many controversies ignited by *The Scholar Denied*. I continue to work with a diverse group of

scholars researching and publishing work generated by ideas advanced in *The Scholar Denied*. Recently, such work has appeared in England, South Africa, and Brazil.

RESEARCH IN PROGRESS, continued

I continue to study social movements, especially the civil rights movement and social movement theory. Currently, my McCarthy Award lecture is undergoing revision for publication in *Mobilization*, the leading journal on social movements and collective action. I have a co-authored paper on race and social movements that is forthcoming in *Caderno CHR*, a leading Brazilian journal. In short, my current and future work will focus on Du Boisian sociology and on race and social movements.
